

(a) Suggested plan: in what ways did Cr's religious priorities influence his political decision-making? Explain using Sources & OK.

Rough outline from OK of main points

- Need for Godly change
- Importance of political peace to enforce Godly change
- Influence of Providence on policy
 - as sign of approval from God
 - as sign of incorrect policy

Basic approach

<p><u>S1:</u> religion does not really influence Religion plays no part (+ key phrase) Power = more imp (+ key phrase)</p>	<p><i>Closing 1st PP</i> <i>Imposing MG's</i> <i>Power wielded as Protector</i></p>
<p><u>S2:</u> religion does influence Defeat seen as a sign/trial (+ key phrase)</p> <p>→ more specific religious focus on later policies</p>	<p>= <i>Western Design</i> <i>Origins of WD rooted in religious motives</i> <i>Failure seen as sign from God</i></p> <p>→ <i>influencing setting up of MG's</i> <i>(eg Godly elements of their Instructions)</i></p>
<p><u>S3:</u> religion does influence Religion takes priority (+ key phrase) Constit change was to serve the need for a Godly reformation (+ key phrase)</p> <p>Would try other structures if need be to achieve this (+ key phrase)</p> <p>But religion does not totally influence: Political necessity meant Cr could only have rel liberty if army enforced it. This might hinder religious progress eg from source</p>	<p><i>1st PP closed partly due to lack of religious Progress</i> <i>MG's set up to meet Cr's religious motives</i></p> <p><i>Barebones support / 1st PP / MG's / use of ordinances/consideration of the Crown)</i></p> <p><i>Need to keep army support: taxation → opposition to policies in general/ rejection of the Crown</i></p>
<p><u>OK:</u> religion does influence</p>	<p><i>Influence of Providence in period between end of 1st PP & MG's</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Signs</i> • <i>Western design failure</i> • <i>Vaudois massacre</i>
